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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Located in West Bengal, Chakdaha College is one of the premier Higher Education Institutions in the southern part of the Nadia district. The College is an UG General Degree College, established on the 21st of November, 1972. Affiliated to the University of Kalyani, the college subsists on Grant-in-aid, and has both 2(f) and 12(B) recognitions from the UGC, New Delhi. The College has been catering to the needs of all the stakeholders since the last 51 years and was accredited by NAAC with grade 'B' in its 1st cycle in 2008 and grade 'B+' in its 2nd cycle in 2016. The College has also received the RUSA 2.0 grant under Component-9 and Component-11 for academic and infrastructural development. As per NEP-2020, the College is currently offering courses in 15 Major Subjects under B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com. The total approved intake capacity for the 1st Semester is 3804. The College has 38 classrooms with Wi-Fi facility in some of them. 14 classrooms are ICT-enabled. There are 15 well-equipped laboratories, one room (Barnaparichay) dedicated for fostering Indian Knowledge System and 02 Seminar Rooms, 5 smart classrooms. The college also has a museum named Haridas Mitra Shabhakaksha, a conference room named Rammohan Kaksha, a separate room for the IQAC, separate Common Rooms for Boys and Girls, Students' Union room, one Gymnasium, students' and staff-canteen, one yoga room and room for research development cell. The office operates through separate sections, namely the Accounts Department, Cash section, General section and a section for facilitating the differently abled students. There is also a threestoried Central Library called 'Sonar Tori' with 29482 number of Books, 06 hard copy Journals, 04 Magazines,04 Daily Newspapers and about 6658 E-Journals and 10194809 titles as E-books that can be accessed through N-List. This knowledge hub provides a quiet and an academically conducive ambience for the students as well as the faculty members. The College is committed to mold the students as responsible citizens through different outreach programmes organized by NSS, NCC and other students of the College.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

A student-friendly infrastructure backed with different learning options and resources cater to students' needs and interests.

- Quality infrastructure: Chakdaha College, a co-education institution for Undergraduate studies and Distance Education (UG and PG under NSOU) under the University of Kalyani, Nadia(West Bengal) has catered quality infrastructure for five decades.
- Campus infrastructure: Pollution-free, no-smoking-zone, WIFI-enabled college-campus, surveilled by CCTVs assures 24×7 security. Nine buildings include the Administrative and Accounts sections, Haridas Mitra Pradorshanee Kaksha, Teachers' and Girls' Common Rooms, 38 classrooms, 15 laboratories, Seminar Hall, fully automated Central Library et al.
- Infrastructural facilities: The campus features water-purifiers, generators, water-cooler, fire-extinguishers, separate washrooms for male/female students and staff, ramps and wheelchairs for Divyangjan, a smart classroom with gallery facility, free yoga-centre and vending machine (for girls), xerox-corner, gymnasium (for teachers and staff), AJC Bose Polyhouse for medicinal plants, canteen, boys' hostel, students' union room etc.
- ICT facilities: With 111 computers and ICT-equipped classrooms and Seminar Hall, the IT infrastructure of the college is satisfactory. Varying bandwidth (60-200 mbps) suffices the Internet-connection. The computer-center of the college in collaboration with reputed computer-organizations under DOEACC runs a certificate/diploma course.
- Extra-academic sports activities: Sports activities include State level cricket participation, along with round the year participation in volleyball, badminton, kabaddi, karate, football etc. Students have also secured positions in Annual Athletics Meet.

• Extra-academic cultural activities: Cultural activities include Rabindra Jayanti, Fresher's Welcome, International Mother Language Day, Annual Prize Distribution Day, birth anniversaries of luminaries etc.

Student Support and Progression

Academic support is provided for an unhindered tenure of study and students' progressions are monitored to assess the curricular framework.

- **Financial Support**: 22,827 students were benefited by scholarships and freeships provided by the Government and 8,599 students were benefited from college merit cum means freeships.
- **Skill Enhancements**: Capacity building and skill enhancement initiatives like seminars or webinars on soft skills, Yoga, Karate and practical demonstration of the use of ICT tools. Courses like 'Advance Excel', 'Web Designing by Photoshop and HTML' have been conducted.
- Career Guidance: 14,948 and 486 students were benefited by the guidance for competitive examinations and by the Career Counselling Cell respectively. The college facilitates career-centric grooming through an online competitive software, 'Entry in Service'.
- Against sexual harassment and ragging: The institution adopts strict measures for redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases and displays contact details of ICC members in the campus.
- Students' placements: 720 outgoing students were placed and / or progressed to higher education.
- Student's performances and achievements: 95 students have qualified in state/national/international level examinations including JAM, JEST, NET, SET, GATE, GMAT, CAT, State government examinations and central govt. examinations. Students won awards/medals for outstanding performance in sports/ cultural activities at university / state/ national / international level.
- Cultural and Sports events: An average of 159 sports and cultural events have been organised by the institution.
- **Alumni association**: Registered Chakdaha 'Abahoman' Society engages in the development of the institution through financial and support services.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The administrative structure of the college through good governance, leadership and management provide support to the academic proceedings.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	(i) Chakdaha College is affiliated to the University of Kalyani. Till 2022-23, the college has offered higher education (UG level) to the students of different disciplines BA/BSc/BCom (Honours and Program) Courses in seventeen subjects- Bengali, English, Sanskrit, Political Science, History, Philosophy, Economics, Geography, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, Accountancy, Education, Statistics, Computer Science. Further, Environmental studies (ENVS) was offered as a compulsory subject for all students. Thus the College follows a multidisciplinary approach to provide a platform for diversified and quality higher education. (ii) Prior to the implementation of NEP, the college had arranged many seminars on NEP with all the stake-holders. As the first step, the College introduced Credit Based Four Year Degree Courses with 15 Major and Minor subjects from 2023-2024 and also introduced multiple entry and exit options at different stages as framed by the University. (iv) Introduction of different popular certificate/add-on courses across disciplines have proved to be fruitful. Emphasis has also been given on seminars/workshops/field visits/study tours etc. to enrich the curriculum.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

- Curriculum Planning Chakdaha College operationalises the curricula endorsed by its affiliating university, the University of Kalyani. Some faculty members actively partake, as members of the Board of Studies, in the curriculum planning and development at the university level
- The Academic sub-committee in consultation with the IQAC designs and develops the curriculum of the add on certificate courses.
- **Designing of Time-table** Every teaching session commences under the aegis of the principal through a collaborative deliberation by the Academic sub-committee, the Routine sub-committee and the IQAC. The decisions taken and the routine formalized is then delegated to every faculty member through the departmental Heads followed by an intricate lesson planning by all concerned.
- The Academic subcommittee formulates a detailed academic calendar for the college in compliance with the tentative time-table received by the affiliating University for various academic activities like admissions, holidays, examinations etc. The academic calendar determines the number of direct teaching hours, practical classes, tutorial classes, library periods and other academic activities.
- Continuous Evaluation Process In addition to the directives issued by the University on the assessment process, the college practises constant evaluation through class tests, sudden tests, project works and other academic activities. Students are encouraged to participate in inter and intra-college competitions for a self-evaluation as well.
- Innovative Teaching Mechanism and E-Learning The usage of ICT tools integrated with the Google Workspace for an updated teaching-learning process is regularly practiced alongside the more traditional methods of teaching. The college also maintains E-learning platforms (Youtube Channels) and Learning Management System (LMS) for online study-materials.
- **E-Resources** The library with its all-encompassing management system of KOHA acts as a supplement to the curriculum. Apart from the reference books on the shelf, the students are encouraged to explore the inexhaustible E-resources available through an access to NLIST and NDLI, thereby expanding their understanding of the curriculum.
- Experiential Learning The college keenly promotes experiential learning for the students through a frequent organization of field-trips, seminars, paper presentations, quiz-competitions, cultural functions and various add-on certificate courses for their holistic development. Efforts are also made to sensitize the students to issues of gender, environment and social ethics through mentoring within the space of classroom and beyond.
- Inter-Departmental Faculty Exchange Programme Faculty members are also encouraged to participate in Faculty development programmes and Exchange programmes for broadening their

- perspective on the curriculum and ways of disseminating it.
- **Feedback** An annual feedback on the implementation of the curriculum along with other contingent matters of the college is collected from the students, compiled and worked upon by the IQAC cell in conjunction with the departments. Response:

Affiliated to the University of Kalyani, the college implements the curriculum endorsed by the University. Framed with an awareness of the contemporary times, the curriculum serves to sensitize the students to cross cutting issues relevant in the every-day experience and beyond. The intellectual environment of the college, its academic, administrative, social and cultural practices also contribute in this regard.

- **Professional Ethics** The IQAC had organized a workshop on Intellectual Property Rights, inculcating an awareness among the students on issues of plagiarism and the need for accurate referencing in assignments and research practices. - Gender The curriculum engagements of subjects within the Humanities delve deep into the issues of gender. The college has an active Women Cell that timely celebrates Women's Day and frequently organizes seminars, screens pertinent documentaries, encourages participatory activities, arranges self-defense programmes for female students, and invites eminent resource persons for a deliberation on issues of gender. The NSS unit of the college also contributes towards gender sensitization. In the past, it has organized awareness programmes for the nutritional improvement of women's health.
- Human Values Academically, Core Courses and other courses offered under subjects like Political Science, English, Bengali, Education, Economics, History and Philosophy critically examine issues on human values. The NSS unit of the college also shows an active involvement

- in uplifting human values through its organization of blood donation camps, food relief programmes, and donation of clothes, books and stationaries.
- Environment The curriculum of Botany, Zoology, Physics, Chemistry, Environmental Science and Geography channelize the knowledge of the students onto pressing issues like environmental pollution, environmental hazards, global warming, Ozone depletion, acid rain, conservation of natural resources, ecology, biodiversity, renewable energy, green chemistry and much more. The NSS unit is active on the forefront in promoting environmental welfare. It has organized cleanliness drives, afforestation programmes, celebration of World Environment Day, and many awareness programmes on topics like the importance of water conservation and hazards of plastic waste.
- Sustainability The campus of the college as a plastic-free zone, the installation of solar panels and reservoir for the conservation of rain water further reflect an eco-friendly campus and concrete efforts to retain environmental sustainability. Apart from being environment sensitive, the infrastructure of the college also has provisions for students with disabilities.

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

The assessment mechanism at our institution encompasses three types: end-term/external assessments, internal assessments, and ongoing assessments conducted by teachers throughout the academic year. The introduction of the CBCS mode of teaching-learning since 2018 has formalized and structured the internal and external assessment system.

- **1. End-Term/External Assessment:** External assessments are summative evaluations conducted at the conclusion of a course to gauge the overall understanding of the curriculum by the students. End-semester university examinations are conducted to assess the academic performance of the students.
- **2. Internal Assessment:** Internal assessments are formative evaluations that occur continuously during the course, providing insights into students' learning and receptivity at regular intervals. Each paper allocates 20% of marks for University-framed internal assessments, which includes 5 marks designated for attendance.
- **3. Ongoing Assessments by Teachers:** Teachers conduct assessments throughout the year to evaluate students' analytical thinking and descriptive knowledge, encompassing surprise class tests, class lectures, and participation in cultural and social activities. These assessments contribute to the overall evaluation of students' achievements and help in understanding their progress and receptivity. Both university-framed internal assessments and class assessments conducted throughout the year are closely monitored by the Internal Examination Monitoring Cell.

Salient Features of the Assessment Process:

- **Comprehensive Evaluation:** The assessments aim to provide a comprehensive evaluation of students' performance.
- Comparison and Ranking: Assessments are utilized to compare students' performance at different stages and against their peers, leading to the assignment of ranks or grades.
- **Internal Monitoring:** The Internal Examination Monitoring Cell critically monitors both university-framed internal assessments and ongoing class assessments.
- Continuous Improvement: Informal assessments by teachers help in understanding students' learning levels and guide improvements in teaching methods and materials.

In conclusion, our assessment process is designed to holistically evaluate students' academic performance, foster continuous improvement, and ensure a comprehensive understanding of their learning journey.

Transparency: The assessment process adheres to complete transparency. Evaluated answer scripts are accessible to students, and award lists are promptly displayed on the Departmental notice board.

Grievance Redressal: The institution ensures prompt redressal of all student grievances. Questions, queries, and doubts regarding evaluations are addressed and clarified as quickly as possible.

Time-Bound: All academic formalities adhere to the designated timeline outlined in the college's Academic Calendar. The entire examination process, including script checking and results publication, is executed within a specified timeframe. Students receive prior notice of internal assessments, allowing ample preparation time. Typically, internal assessment results are published within seven to ten days of the examination.

Efficiency: The internal assessment mechanism is handled with utmost efficiency by the faculty. In addition to traditional pen-and-paper methods, teachers employ innovative assessment approaches such as viva-voce, group projects, and seminar presentations. Even in written exams, questions are structured with varying patterns (e.g., 2, 5, 10 marks) to comprehensively prepare students for end-semester examinations. This approach fosters the development of the students' ability to articulate their thoughts in their own words. Occasionally, multiple-choice questions (MCQs) are incorporated, compelling students to engage in in-depth subject study.

Holistic Development: The Principal and IQAC Coordinator consistently engage with students, conveying messages aimed at their holistic development. In conclusion, the entire assessment process is designed to contribute to the holistic development of students. The emphasis on transparency, grievance redressal, timeliness, and efficiency ensure a fair and supportive environment for students as they progress through their academic journey.

Response:

The accomplishment of Programmes Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) by students stands as a pivotal objective in curriculum delivery at Chakdaha College and it employs a sophisticated software-based framework for this evaluation, employing a two-step process.

PO-CO Mapping:

• Departments engage in one-to-many mapping of course results with program outcomes, signifying that a single course outcome may impact different program outcomes. The software then generates a correlation mapping between Course Outcome and Programme Outcome.

PO-CO Attainment and Evaluation:

- This technique involves both direct and indirect methods of attainment. In the direct method, Course Outcome and Programme Outcome attainment are assessed based on students' results in various assessments conducted by the respective department and affiliating university. In the indirect method, Program and Course Outcome attainment is evaluated through a survey conducted by the concerned departmental teacher on students undertaking the course.
- Teachers' assessment includes 20% marks for each student. Average score is obtained on the basis of teachers' response. Attainment level score is calculated for each course by combining the scores of 80% of direct method and 20% of indirect method.

A. Direct Methods for Evaluating PO-CO Attainment:

- The institution employs an evaluative approach as a key metric for gauging student performance. The assessment of Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) is conducted based on results from Internal Examinations, University Examinations, and the enrolment of students in higher education programs.
- Course Outcomes are appraised by analyzing the results at the conclusion of each semester, while Programme Outcomes are determined by evaluating the overall program results after a student completes all six semesters.
- In addition to excelling in University Examinations across various subjects, the college boasts a commendable record of students securing admissions for higher studies and achieving success in competitive examinations. Annually, the institution recognizes students with outstanding academic backgrounds, including those securing a first-class or a noteworthy percentage of marks in their final examinations. Substantial achievements by students are also acknowledged.
- Valuable insights into the teaching-learning process are gathered through feedback sessions conducted with students at the conclusion of each academic session.

B. Indirect Ways to Evaluate PO-CO Attainment:

• The progression of students to higher education and placement serves as a determining factor for assessing the learning outcomes, as well as the skills, abilities, and knowledge they have

acquired.

- The evaluation of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes extends to students' progression into higher education or pursuit of professional courses.
- A significant number of students become eligible to participate in competitive exams such as JAM, GATE, and others conducted by both State and Central Governments.
- The Career Counseling Cell at the college provides valuable support to students seeking guidance for their career advancement.
- The active participation of students in various extension programs and campaigns focused on civic and environmental awareness, coupled with their confidence in competitive exams and interviews, serves as an indirect confirmation of the academic knowledge and skills imparted by the courses.

Through this refined software-based approach, Programme and Course Outcome attainment values are evaluated examination-wise, student-wise, specific course-wise and final course attainment-wise. These values along with PO-CO mapping helps in evaluating Course Outcome (CO) and Programme Outcome (PO) attainment individually and the overall attainment of all Programmes.

- Library Management Software: The efficient cataloguing, circulation, and user management at library are ensured through the utilization of cloud-based KOHA (version 21.11.01.000 upgraded to 23.11.00.000). With a user-friendly interface, the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) empowers patrons to digitally search and access resources, thereby facilitating efficient resource discovery.
- Library Orientation Programme: This program provides orientation to every student, acquainting them with both offline and online library access systems.
- **Library Visit:** Within the provision of the class routine, each department arranges library visits for their students.
- **Devices for Library Automation:** By incorporating Barcode Scanners and utilizing computers, the efficiency of data entry and browsing has been improved. Additionally, students' library cards are embossed with barcodes, streamlining the borrowing process with greater accuracy.
- **E-resources:** Being a member of N-LIST (INFLIBNET) provides access to a vast collection of resources, including 10,194,809 e-books and 6,658 e-journals. This significantly enriches the college's digital resource pool.
- **CCTV Surveillance:** A total 8 CCTVs are installed within the central library which also serve for the purpose of safeguard of books and antitheft drive.
- National Digital Library of India (NDLI): Students and faculties can access texts and references for regular and different competitive examinations through National Digital Library of India (NDLI).
- Question Bank and Syllabus: Previous years' end-term question-papers and syllabi are available at library website in digitized form.
- **Remote Access to Library:** Students and staff have the convenience of remote access to bibliographic sources and various e-resources.
- **OER:** Actively participating in the Open Education drive the library as an education hub for Open Educational Resources (OER), decisive in spreading worldwide knowledge and promoting accessible education.
- **Braille facilities:** Library services also include Braille facilities, catering to the needs of visually impaired students and readers.
- Subscription to Journals and E-Journals: In 2018-2019, expenditures amounted to 03.62928 lakh INR for books and 0.1419 lakh INR for journals. In 2019-2020, book expenses rose to 7.8876 lakh INR, while journal expenses were 0.12626 lakh INR. In 2021-2022, journal expenses were 0.08057 lakh INR. In 2022-2023, expenditures on books and journals were 1.40753 lakh INR and 0.08408 lakh INR, respectively. Additionally, the annual expenditure for e-books and journals subscriptions was 0.059 lakh INR for the sessions 2018-2019, 2019-2020, 2021-2022, and 2022-2023.

- ICT Management: A sub-committee named 'E-Learning and ICT Management' under the Teachers' Council oversees all IT-related facilities and seamless connectivity.
- **Web Domains:** The college has three specific domains for its customized and dynamic website: chakdahacollege.ac.in, chakdahacollege.co.in, and chakdahacollege.net/webapps/index.html.
- **Desktops, Laptops, Printers, and Projectors:** The institution boasts an extensive IT infrastructure, including 105 desktops, 27 laptops, 22 number of printers, and 13 projectors, ensuring smooth operation of various academic and administrative functions.
- **Bandwidth Facility:** The bandwidth for the 24x7 internet connection ranged from 60 Mbps as the minimum to 200 Mbps as the maximum from November 2018 to March 2023, utilizing a total of 191 bands during this period.
- **ICT-enabled & Smart Classrooms:** Integration of 14 ICT-enabled classrooms and 05 smart classrooms enhances teaching methodologies, providing an immersive learning experience.
- Wi-Fi Facility: The college campus is nearly entirely Wi-Fi enabled, with a 14 routers strategically placed for widespread coverage.
- Maintenance and Upgradation: C.S.N. MONORANJAN CABLE AND BROADBAND SERVICE oversees the maintenance and upgrading of the bandwidth service, incurring an expenditure of Rs. 1,78,110/- during a specified period.
- **Library Management Software:** The central library uses a cloud-based KOHA software since 2016 (version 21.11.01.000 upgraded to 23.11.00.000) and OPAC interface system for efficient digitization and easy accessibility.
- Learning Management System (LMS) and E-Resources: Chakdaha College has implemented an LMS and E-Resources, providing a centralized platform for seamless access to online texts and references for students and teachers.
- E-Journals: The college publishes the bi-annual peer-reviewed e-journal "Ray: International

- Journal of Multidisciplinary Studies (E-ISSN: 2456-3064)."
- Online Admission Software: The college introduced an online admission system in 2015, utilizing software for new and semester-wise admissions, as well as student fees collection.
- Administrative Software: Various programmed software applications are used for HRMS, PFMS, E-Pension, etc.

6.4.1

Chakdaha College employs strong financial strategies to mobilize funds from diverse sources, prioritizing their optimal utilization for comprehensive institutional development and the well-being of students.

The college implements its financial strategies generally through following steps:

- Detail Scrutiny by Planning Board
- Place the requisition for approval of Finance Committee
- GB approval of work order / quotation
- Tender Process
- Purchase Sub-committee
- Utilization of Fund

Funding Sources:

- **RUSA 2.0 Fund**: Rs. 1,44,72,347/- from RUSA2.0 fuels academic and infrastructural and library growth, covering ICT integration, lab and sports equipment upgrades, and renovation/construction projects.
- Government Grants: The institution receives financial support from the Government of West Bengal, University of Kalyani, and the Government of India for activities like NSS and NCC.
- Scholarships and Grants: Chakdaha College actively pursues scholarships and grants from state and central government bodies and private agencies. These financial aids bolster SC, ST, OBC students, general meritorious students, female students in their educational pursuits, fostering their holistic development.
- **UGC Funds:** Rs.1,80,500/- has been allotted for SC, ST, GENERAL additional grant (equipment) and MRP-Recurring MRP- Recurring Rs.6500 for the college.
- **Funds from students' fee collection:** Funds collected for different purposes from students are utilised specifically and efficiently.
- **Alumni**: The alumni association of the college donated Rs.1 lakh towards the Golden Jubilee celebrations.
- **TS and NTS:** Teaching and Non-teaching staff donated in addition their remuneration for two days amounting to Rs.4,43,957/-.
- **Covid Fund:** All the teaching and the non-teaching staff made contributions during the pandemic amounting to Rs.1,85,203/-.
- Other Sources: These are generated through scrap clearance, Collection of seminar registration fees, Prize money from YPC, room rent from different agencies, NSOU.

Mechanism of Fund Utilization:

The college's robust financial system meticulously handles bills, vouchers, balance sheets, audit statements, incomes, expenditures, and fund utilization methods to prevent mismanagement.

- **Necessary Approval:** Approval from FSC and G.B.
- Estimate & Tender: DPR is prepared as per Govt. guidelines, then estimate is vetted, Tendering is processed as per rule.
- Work Process: For the works, order placed and payment made after the completion of the work.
- Internal audit: Chakdaha College ensures rigorous financial scrutiny by committees appointed by the Governing Body for every transaction and annual budget preparation. The accounts department verifies data before final approval by the Bursar and Principal. The Purchase Committee plays a key role in decision-making, while the Financial and Purchase Subcommittees conduct internal audits, ensuring compliance with regulatory norms.

• External Audit: College conducts an external audit of all the grants at the end of every financial year. A Chartered firm appointed by the Government to examines the balance sheet for incomes, expenditures, receipts and payments done in the financial year. The suggestions of the external auditor are then strictly followed and implemented by the accounts department.

- Free Computer Training Programme: The College provides a free of cost computer training to the willing teachers, non-teaching staff and students at the college.

BEST PRACTICE-I

Title of the Practice: Save Nature to Save Humanity

Objectives of the Practice

- To create among all the stakeholders an awareness of the prevailing environment crisis
- To reduce carbon footprint and overall CO2 emissions
- To plant at least hundred saplings within a year

- To conserve energy and water
- To create a clean and lush green campus with zero waste
- To induce a harmonious ecological balance in the campus

The Context:

- The threatening rise in the levels of global warming
- Increase in the frequency of natural calamities
- Extreme weather conditions and erratic weather patterns
- Unchecked levels of greenhouse gas emissions, rapid deforestation and increased consumption of energies

The Practice:

- The college has an active Eco-Management and Campus Beautification Sub-Committee that follows an environmental policy to maintain cleanliness and hygiene on the campus and to make the campus ecologically sustainable.
- The college arranged a program titled 'Save water to save life on the earth', in collaboration with the West Bengal Pollution Control Board (WBPCB).
- In assistance with the Water Resources Investigation and Development Department (WRIDD), SWID, Government of West Bengal, the students of the department of Chemistry regularly study the parameters of drinking water in the adjacent area and make necessary suggestions or mark if the levels are alarming.
- The college follows the policy of paperless office work to minimize environmental hazards. Furthermore, the application form for admission flashes several images of awareness programs titled 'Say No To Plastic', 'Safe Drive, Save Life' etc.
- The college takes necessary measures for the management of wastes with the help of the Chakdaha Municipality. There is also a biodegradable waste pit and a compost pit in the campus for the purpose.
- Solar photovoltaic panels have been installed in order to meet the partial energy requirements of the campus.
- A rainwater reservoir (Akashbari) has been installed in the campus.
- Multiple eco-friendly artificial bird-houses have been affixed to the trees in the campus for creating an inviting space for birds.
- The college organized a seminar on Radiation Hazards from Domestic Gadgets to raise the awareness of the students.
- The college has undertaken an environmental audit in order to frame better policies and methodologies for making the campus more environmentally sensitive and sustainable.

Evidence of Success:

- The college has succeeded in maintaining a pollution-free, plastic-free campus with specific nonoise zones.
- Students use bicycles instead of motor bikes for commuting.
- The foundational day of the college, 21st of November has been declared as a 'No Vehicle Day'.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- There is no provision for managing E-waste.
- There is a need for more updated vending machines in the girl's common room.

BEST PRACTICE-II

Title of the Practice: Sustainable development of girl students (SD goal 5 as per global agenda)

Objectives of the Practice:

- To embolden the students with the capacity to solve their problems and to encourage them to be self-reliant and financially independent.
- To heighten their ability to detect anything suspicious or problematic
- To sensitize the students to gender inequality and discrimination

The Context:

- The socio-political and the economic condition of the women in the suburban side still needs to be addressed.
- More than 55% of the students in the institution are girls, hailing from a rural background.

The Practice:

- The college has an active Women Cell which strives to empower the female students in every possible way. From organizing seminars on legal awareness to arranging certificate courses on women's rights, the cell endeavours to make the students aware of the gender inequality pervasive in the society.
- As per the government mandate, the college has an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) to ensure protection of women against sexual harassment at workplace and redressal of associated complaints.
- The college regularly organizes seminars concerning physical and mental health of women, and issues relevant to social awareness like the Awareness program on Women's Safety, 'Save the Girls Child' etc.
- The Career Counseling cell organizes several programs and career talks for expanding placement opportunities for women. The cell collaborated with Mahindra Pride Classroom on Employability Skill Training Programme which was exclusively for female students and completely free of cost. It also organized a talk on "Career Opportunities in Nursing".
- A free course on Yoga and Karate was organized for the female students to boost their capacity of self-defence.
- The college has a staff canteen run exclusively by women.
- Medical camps are regularly organized for both the students and women of the adjacent Lodha community, like eye test and health check-up camps.

Evidence of Success

- Two female NCC cadet, Supriya Talukdar and Rakhija Khatun, were awarded Governor's Medal and DG Commendation for best NCC cadet in the year 2022 and 2023 respectively.
- The college extended a helping hand to a female scholar researching cervical cancer through the data of the female students and was benefited by the knowledge gained in the matter.
- A better record in university admissions, and in qualification of national level examinations like GATE, NET, SET, etc.
- Efficient working profile in national-level institutions like Sai Life Science, Hyderabad, IIT Madras, IACS, and NIT.
- The total share of female students in the college has increased substantially to 56% and the percentage of female students graduating is higher than that of the males.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Female students are reluctant to cross academic boundaries.
- Students are usually hesitant in opening up on matters sensitive to their body or matters related to their mental health.
- It becomes difficult to organize various programs outside working-hours, especially in online mode.

The singular thrust of the college therefore has been on the social commitment intrinsic to the idea of a true liberty. Chakdaha College Social Responsibility Discharge Platform has been formed to frame the policy in this regard. Community Development fund with the contribution from the students has also been generated. The following list of activities reflect the initiatives taken in this direction:

- Inspired by the distinctiveness of the college, the logo of the Golden Jubilee Celebration envisions a harmonious coexistence between humanity, nature and technology. As a part of its yearlong celebration, the college organized various academic, cultural and social events to emphasize the need to integrate humanity, nature and technology as a path to the expansion of our horizons.
- In 2018 the college had organized a Farmer's Awareness Programme in association with Indian Meteorological Department, Alipore and in 2021 programmes were organized by the Bidhan Chandra Krishi Viswavidyalaya and the Regional Meteorological Centre. Keeping in mind that a large number of students head from an agrarian background, these programmes focused on uplifting the farmer community through the propagation of modern technological devices, tools and apps.
- To encourage an experiential learning beyond the curriculum, the department of history had organized field visits to the Indian Museum and the Chandraketugarh. The purpose was to enrich the students in the knowledge of Indian traditional history and heritage.
- The college frequently organizes social relief camps other than those mandated under NSS. The college adopted the adjacent Lodha community in the aftermath of the pandemic. Apart from frequently providing them with adequate clothing and food on many occasions, the college also organized a health check-up for the children and women of the community and distributed sanitary napkins among them. As a gesture of integrating them within the mainstream society, the college had also organized a sports event for the children of the Lodha community on its Annual Sports Day in 2021.
- The college made a contribution of rupees ten thousand to the Sarada Ashram in the year 2021 and rupees seventy thousand consecutively in the year 2022 and 2023. Believing in the idea of self-emancipation and upliftment of human beings particularly women, has always been a creed that the college follows and endorses.
- In association with the Chakdaha State General Hospital, the college organized a Diabetes Prevention and Awareness Programme in order to benefit all the stakeholders. A poster competition was also held in this regard following which the posters made by the students were displayed in the rural health centers to raise the awareness of the people.
- In order to motivate and spark interests and curiosity in young minds, the college had organized a quiz competition and a lab visit for secondary students from near-by schools. The students were exposed to and guided through the laboratories of the department of Chemistry and Zoology under the guidance of the faculty members.
- In order to make the students aware and alert to contemporary natures of crime and other financial issues the college had organized the Consumer Awareness Programme and seminar on

- legal awareness for the students of the college. The college had also organized a seminar on cyber safety for school students from class IX to XII.
- The college strives to create a Community Development Fund with the help of the students as an active participant in the development and welfare activities. Each student contributes Rs 30 per year to this fund.
- The college has taken initiatives to arrange certificate courses on topics outside the curriculum like the course on 'Snake: Science and Superstition' by the department of Zoology, 'Food Adulteration: Its Detection and Mitigation' by the department of Chemistry, 'Women's Studies' by the Women Cell, 'Human Rights in India' by the department of Political Science etc

Through its persistent endeavors of serving the society, the college has been able to achieve for the students the following outcomes:

- Development of we-feeling
- Nurturing social bonding.
- Fostering leadership qualities.
- Encouraging social responsibility.
- Inducing a sense of self-respect and respect for each other.
- Apart from the above-mentioned outcomes, the college has made further contributions towards the society during times of distress:
- During the pandemic, the college had created a Covid Fund of an amount of Rs. 1,85, 203 (contributions were made by all the teaching and non-teaching staff).
- The college had donated an oxygen concentrator to the Chakdaha state general hospital and many oxygen cylinders were provided for the general public.
- The college had contributed 1 lakh rupees to the State Government fund.
- The college carried out social outreach programs extensively in the aftermath of both the cyclone Yash and the cyclone Amphan.

The dream of the college is to mould the students into responsible Indian citizens, to inculcate in them traditional values and a positive attitude for expanding their horizon. The college dreams to build a future organically accommodating humanity through social commitment, environmental consciousness through relevant policies and a viable technology friendly educational program.

- Chakdaha College's NCC unit proudly showcases a sterling record, with standout achievements including Partha Pal's conquest of the Basic Mountaineering Course in July and the stellar performance of Ankita mandi and Ramiz Mondal at the Thal Sainik Camp in August 2023. In November 2023, Jenifa Ritu Gomes completed the West Bengal & Sikkim Trek I/II for girls, with two more camps, including the Republic Day Camp in New Delhi, awaiting in January 2024.
- On July 29, 2023, Shreya Barman, a Semester-II student in the Department of Zoology, clinched the top spot in a drawing contest held in Maharashtra for International Tiger Day. The college's illustrious legacy in National and International sports and athletics competitions continues to thrive.
- Chakdaha College, entrusted by the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal, conducted a district-level NAAC workshop with fineness, despite rigorous SSR preparations. The event, titled "Hands on Training of NAAC Methodology and Preparation", welcomed Dr. Tilak Chatterjee, a State Level Mentor of NAAC.
- Charting a course for further advancement, the college has initiated tenders for books and gym equipment, utilizing the enriching funds from RUSA 2.0.
- This narrative reflects the harmonious convergence of vision and action, embellishing Chakdaha College's journey with grace and accomplishment.

Concluding Remarks:

Furnished with feedback from the first and the second NAAC cycles, Chakdaha College has diligently embraced their valuable suggestions, steering towards a commitment to holistic education. Many of their recommendations have materialized, and the college remains optimistic about further improvements. The IQAC consistently endeavours in the direction. With an average of 86.32% Full-Time faculties against sanctioned posts, the institution has successfully carried out market-driven certificate courses across various departments. Generous RUSA grants have propelled significant advancements in sports infrastructure, manifesting in a fully-equipped gymnasium and increased sports goods, thereby elevating the frequency of college-hosted sports events. While physical space expansion remains a challenge, the college has effectively integrated new setups, including a language lab and a newly constructed building within the limited premises. Ongoing efforts persist in regulating student dropout rates and achieving parity in the teacher-student ratio.

During the challenging times of the COVID-19 pandemic, Chakdaha College has adeptly enabled students to

use ICT tools and transformed its spaces into ICT-enabled rooms. Beyond self-preservation, the institution has reached out to provide essential social support enacting within pandemic protocols. The research culture, with an expanded access to INFLIBNET e-journals, has yielded a significant number of peer-reviewed publications. As a testament to its social responsibility, the college has adopted Lodha village, prioritizing women's health and children's education. Apart from this, the college committed year-round support of two orphans from Gayeshpur Sarada Ashram, marked by an annual generous donation of Rs. 70,000. NSS and NCC volunteers have conducted impactful outreach programs, including awareness campaigns on the Ganga Action Plan, Dengue Awareness, Swachh Bharat Mission etc. The pledge to plant 1000 saplings annually has been met with success.

The existent distance-learning PG courses in the college add an impetus to contemplate of regular PG courses in demanding subjects in the future. The college dreams of securing a national ranking in the coming years and aspires towards international collaborative programs. Firmly aligning with its motto, Chakdaha College tirelessly strives to foster students as socially and nationally responsible citizens, and create the refined version of society it envisions.
